



HISTORY OF MONIFIETH HIGH SCHOOL



Our school building was only opened on Monday 17th November 1980. By this time, however, the school community was already over 4 years old.





Before 1976, young people from the Burgh of Monifieth had traveled to Carnoustie High School during their secondary school years. On 17th August 1976, however, the new Monifieth High School opened with 132 pupils and 16 teachers. Because work had not even started on the building, all pupils were taken by bus each day to the former Stobswell Boys' Primary School in Melrose Terrace, Dundee.

OPENING DAY INSTRUCTIONS (17.08.76)

There are numerous colourful stories from the school's early years in Melrose Terrace. The building had not been well maintained and there were particular problems with the old coal-fired boilers, as revealed in the detailed school log kept by our first Rector, Mr. Hector Low:

4 January 1979: "The staff all reported for duty but we found there was no heating.....the school would be closed till Monday 8th."

8 January 1979: "The pupils arrived only to be sent home at 11.00am & told not to report back until Thursday. The toilets were completely frozen & the inlet water pupils were all burst."

10 January 1979: "I sent the staff home at 2.00pm.....although we were burning fuel steadily no heat was coming through the pipes."

11 January 1979: "Pupils returned....The toilets were finally working by 11.45am. There was a dispute in the boiler house between the Janitor and the heating engineers....the boiler flues [airways leading to the chimney] were chocked solid with ashes and dust. When these were opened, the boiler house filled with smoke."

Hector Low was famous for his dry wit and his Rector's Log goes on to describe being caught in the middle of a furious argument between the Janitor and the engineers while ashes and dust billowed around them in the depths of the stricken boiler house.

The original boiler house chimney still stands today, though the Melrose Terrace building is now part of Dundee College and the coal-fired boiler has long since been replaced.





The first staff photograph!



This picture was the 1st year of MHS 1976-1977.

The first school show took place in June 1977. Every pupil in the school (around 130 in total!) took part in some way in staging excerpts from 'Oliver'.



Fagin looks a little older than the rest of the cast, because he was played by David Easson, Principal Teacher of Mathematics. David was the longest-serving of the original staff members, only retiring in June 2007.



Right from the start, the emphasis was on broadening pupils' horizons. There were field trips (this was one of the first, to a Royal Navy ship in Dundee Docks, 1977). Parties went on the School ship SS "Uganda". There were early holidays to mainland Europe (when the spending money for the entire trip was kept on the coach in a large handbag underneath the seat of a certain lady staff member!)






This staff photograph was taken in summer 1979, the last term in Melrose Terrace. The school started in 1976 with only S1 pupils, so each year brought a major increase in numbers of both pupils and staff.



By the time we moved to the new building in the following session (1979 - 80) the staff has grown again, but it is still only a fraction of our current total (almost 120 teachers and support staff!)



The new school building finally opened to pupils on Friday 17th August 1979. Pupils had been given 3 days of extra holidays to allow the staff to sort out all the furniture, stores, and books that had been transported from Melrose Terrace.

In fact, the building was only partially completed and Hector Low's School Log records that it is opened "minus sports complex, playing fields and link corridor". Most of the houses that now surround the school had not yet been built. The Rector's Log for 29th August 1979 records a request from Balmoissie Farm that pupils should not walk over the fields on their way to school.



It seems strange that the official opening of Monifieth High School was not until 17th November 1980. It was a high-profile event, however, with Tayside Region Councillors and distinguished guests. Lord Thomson of Monifieth formally declared the building open at 2.30pm. As the photographs on the following pages show, there were numerous displays by pupils as Lord Thomson “made a thorough tour of the building.” The Rector’s Log records that:

How times have changed! The electronic typewriters in Business Studies and one of the Home Economics kitchens were displayed as up-to-date features on Opening Day. The typewriters and the gas cookers have long since been replaced.





Grey, unpainted breeze-block walls were thought to be fashionable (as in the Art Department). Visitors who have returned to the school in recent years always comment that the modern paintwork is far more cheerful than the original austere concrete.





By 1980 the school was already building an enviable reputation and this was a great chance to show everyone what we were doing.

R ECTORS



Mr Hector Low



Our first rector was Hector Low. A colourful and charismatic personality, he was affectionately known (though not to his face!) as 'Hector the Rector'. Having come from a very different type of school in the West of Scotland, he developed Monifieth High School from its first day until it became one of the highest achieving schools in Scotland.

Mr Low retired on 30th September 1994. A staff dinner celebrated his 18 years in the school. This mock 'Report' was issued at the dinner. Hector remained a good friend of the school, and returned to give a hilariously witty speech on the school's history at the 25th Anniversary Dinner



Mr Jim Collins



Mr Jim Collins took up post as our second Rector, on Monday 12th December 1994. The next 5 years was a time of rapid change in education. New courses, new technology (especially computers) and new ideas swept into the school. The school started to work more closely with business and industry. Work Experience took pupils out into the community.

Some of the traditions that we take for granted were started at this time – like our very successful Prefect system.

With local government reform in 1996, Monifieth was transferred from Tayside Region to Angus Council. This caused a major increase in our catchment area, which now covered the whole of south-west Angus. Young people from Birkhill, Liff, Auchterhouse and even Newtyle, who had previously gone to schools in Dundee, now traveled by school buses to Monifieth.

The school started to grow and by 2000 had topped 1000 pupils.





Mr Richard Coton



Our third Rector was Mr. Richard Coton, who served the school from May 2000 until June 2013, a period of just over 13 years.

Widespread changes have continued under his Rectorship, with significant improvements and extensions to the building, many new courses, and greater responsibility for pupils in helping to run the school.

During his Rectorship, the school became increasingly well known throughout Scotland. It became a lead school for key national projects, from the use of IT in Science to the introduction of Curriculum for Excellence to Transformative Innovation. High profile visits have come from a Minister for Education (twice), the Permanent Secretary to the Scottish Government, and a range of senior civil servants and government advisers. Not only staff but also senior pupils have spoken in national conferences.

Additionally there have been international links with schools and education projects in India, Lebanon, Denmark, Canada and the USA. The school has established a partnership with Lipscomb University, Nashville, USA. This involves annual visits by professors and students from Lipscomb University, a bi-annual visit by Monifieth pupils to Nashville, and seminars for our pupils being delivered by American professors via video link.
